- 1. COUNTING MIRACLES, by Nicholas Sparks. (Random House.) A man in search of the father he never knew encounters a single mom and rumors circulate of the nearby appearance of a white deer. <u>H B</u>
- 2. INTERMEZZO, by Sally Rooney. (Farrar, Straus and Giroux.) After the passing of their father, seemingly different brothers engage in relationships and seek ways to cope. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 3. THE WOMEN, by Kristin Hannah. (St. Martin's.) In 1965, a nursing student follows her brother to serve during the Vietnam War and returns to a divided America. <u>H B</u>
- 4. HERE ONE MOMENT, by Liane Moriarty. (Crown.) Passengers on a short and seemingly unremarkable flight learn how and when they are going to die. <u>B</u>
- 5. PLAYGROUND, by Richard Powers. (Norton.) Residents of an island in French Polynesia must vote on whether to send floating cities out onto the open sea. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 6. IRON FLAME, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) The second book in the Empyrean series. Violet Sorrengail's next round of training might require her to betray the man she loves. <u>H B</u>
- 7. THE LIFE IMPOSSIBLE, by Matt Haig. (Viking.) A retired math teacher who inherits a run-down house on a Mediterranean island from a friend goes in search of answers. <u>H</u> <u>B</u>
- 8. SOMEWHERE BEYOND THE SEA, by TJ Klune. (Tor.) The second book in the Cerulean Chronicles series. The headmaster of a strange orphanage seeks to protect the magical children who reside there. **B**
- 9. TELL ME EVERYTHING, by Elizabeth Strout. (Random House.) As a murder casts a pall on a town in Maine, Lucy Barton, Olive Kitteridge and Bob Burgess share stories and seek meaning. <u>B</u>
- 10. THE NIGHT WE LOST HIM, by Laura Dave. (S&S/Marysue Rucci.) Estranged siblings look into the death of their hotel magnate father and uncover a family secret. <u>B</u>
- 11. THE GAMES GODS PLAY, by Abigail Owen. (Red Tower.) Gods enlist mortals to fight in their stead to determine who will sit on the throne in Olympus. O B
- 12. THE GOD OF THE WOODS, by Liz Moore. (Riverhead.) When a 13-year-old girl disappears from an Adirondack summer camp in 1975, secrets kept by the Van Laar family emerge. <u>H B</u>
- 13. WE SOLVE MURDERS, by Richard Osman. (Pamela Dorman.) When a dead body and a bag of money turn up on a remote island, Amy Wheeler reaches out to her retired father-in-law to help investigate. <u>B</u>

- 14. THE BUTCHER GAME, by Alaina Urquhart. (Zando.) The second book in the Dr. Wren Muller series. A serial killer wants to settle a score with a forensic pathologist. <u>B</u>
- 15. BY ANY OTHER NAME, by Jodi Picoult. (Ballantine.) A young woman's play about her ancestor Emilia Bassano, who wrote Shakespeare's works, is submitted to a festival under a male pseudonym. **B**

- 1. THE SMALL AND THE MIGHTY, by Sharon McMahon. (Thesis.) A former high school government and law teacher profiles lesser-known Americans who made an impact. <u>B</u>
- 2. TRUTHS, by Vivek Ramaswamy. (Threshold Editions.) The entrepreneur and former Republican presidential candidate shares his opinions on a variety of issues.
- 3. CONFRONTING THE PRESIDENTS, by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard. (St. Martin's.) The conservative commentator evaluates the legacies of American presidents.
- 4. THE ANXIOUS GENERATION, by Jonathan Haidt. (Penguin Press.) A co-author of "The Coddling of the American Mind" looks at the mental health impacts that a phone-based life has on children. **B**

- 8. NEXUS, by Yuval Noah Harari. (Random House.) The author of "Sapiens" delves into how societies and political systems have used information and gives a warning about artificial intelligence.
- 9. LOVELY ONE, by Ketanji Brown Jackson. (Random House.) The first Black woman ever confirmed to the Supreme Court traces her family's history and her personal ascent.
- 10. THE THIRD GILMORE GIRL, by Kelly Bishop with Lindsay Harrison. (Gallery.) The dancer and actress, who appeared in "A Chorus Line," "Dirty Dancing" and "Gilmore Girls," imparts insights on career longevity. <u>B</u>
- 11. LUCKY LOSER, by Russ Buettner and Susanne Craig. (Penguin Press.) The New York Times and Pulitzer Prize-winning reporters detail the fortunes and failures behind Donald Trump's wealth.
- 12. ON FREEDOM, by Timothy Snyder. (Crown.) The author of "On Tyranny" articulates practices and attitudes related to the concept of freedom and the ways it can be misunderstood.
