Fiction

- 1. TO DIE FOR, by David Baldacci. (Grand Central.) The third book in the 6:20 Man series. Devine digs into the deaths of an orphan's parents and uncovers a large conspiracy. OB
- 2. THE WOMEN, by Kristin Hannah. (St. Martin's.) In 1965, a nursing student follows her brother to serve during the Vietnam War and returns to a divided America. H B
- 3. IRON FLAME, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) The second book in the Empyrean series. Violet Sorrengail's next round of training might require her to betray the man she loves. HB
- 4. JAMES, by Percival Everett. (Doubleday.) A reimagining of "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" shines a different light on Mark Twain's classic, revealing new facets of the character of Jim. H B
- 5. THE COURTING OF BRISTOL KEATS, by Mary E. Pearson. (Flatiron.) After a tragedy, Bristol travels to a dangerous world to try to save her father.
- 6. COUNTING MIRACLES, by Nicholas Sparks. (Random House.) A man in search of the father he never knew encounters a single mom and rumors circulate of the nearby appearance of a white deer. H B
- 7. IN TOO DEEP, by Lee Child and Andrew Child. (Delacorte.) The 29th book in the Jack Reacher series. Reacher wakes up in a precarious position with no memory of how he got there. H B
- 8. THE WAITING, by Michael Connelly. (Little, Brown.) The sixth book in the Ballard and Bosch series. Bosch's daughter, Maddie, becomes a new volunteer on the cold case unit. B
- 9. COURT OF THE VAMPIRE QUEEN, by Katee Robert. (Sourcebooks Casablanca.) Mina encounters three vampire men and weighs whether to face down her father.
- 10. THE GREY WOLF, by Louise Penny. (Minotaur.) The 19th book in the Chief Inspector Gamache series. Shifting alliances complicate the frenzied pursuit of a sinister threat. <u>B</u>
- 11. THE GOD OF THE WOODS, by Liz Moore. (Riverhead.) When a 13-year-old girl disappears from an Adirondack summer camp in 1975, secrets kept by the Van Laar family emerge. H B
- 12. BUTCHER & BLACKBIRD, by Brynne Weaver. (Slowburn.) A friendship between the rival murderers Sloane and Rowan develops into something more. B
- 13. FOURTH WING, by Rebecca Yarros. (Red Tower.) Violet Sorrengail is urged by the commanding general, who also is her mother, to become a candidate for the elite dragon riders. H B

- 14. INTERMEZZO, by Sally Rooney. (Farrar, Straus and Giroux.) After the passing of their father, seemingly different brothers engage in relationships and seek ways to cope. H B
- 15. CLIVE CUSSLER: DESOLATION CODE, by Graham Brown. (Putnam.) The 21st book in the NUMA Files series. An A.I. system might be behind an attempt to create a new world order. O B

- 1. MELANIA, by Melania Trump. (Skyhorse.) The former first lady describes her work as a fashion model, marriage to Donald Trump and time in the White House. H B
- 2. FRAMED, by John Grisham and Jim McCloskey. (Doubleday.) Our criminal justice system viewed through the struggles of 10 wrongfully convicted people to achieve exoneration. B
- 3. THE ANXIOUS GENERATION, by Jonathan Haidt. (Penguin Press.) A co-author of "The Coddling of the American Mind" looks at the mental health impacts that a phone-based life has on children. B
- 4. THE WAR ON WARRIORS, by Pete Hegseth. (Broadside.) The former "Fox & Friends Weekend" host shares his experiences serving in the Army and his views on the current state of the American military.
- 5. CONFRONTING THE PRESIDENTS, by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard. (St. Martin's.) The conservative commentator evaluates the legacies of American presidents. B
- 6. REVENGE OF THE TIPPING POINT, by Malcolm Gladwell. (Little, Brown.) Through a series of stories, Gladwell explicates the causes of various kinds of epidemics. H B
- 7. THE MESSAGE, by Ta-Nehisi Coates. (One World.) The author of "Between the World and Me" travels to three locations to uncover the dissonance between the realities on the ground and the narratives shaped about them. B
- 8. FROM HERE TO THE GREAT UNKNOWN, by Lisa Marie Presley and Riley Keough. (Random House.) Presley's memoir, completed by her daughter, explores her relationships and challenges. B
- 9. BE READY WHEN THE LUCK HAPPENS, by Ina Garten. (Crown.) A memoir by the cookbook author and Food Network host known as the Barefoot Contessa. B
- 10. WAR, by Bob Woodward. (Simon & Schuster.) The Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist looks at our contentious time through battles in Ukraine and the Middle East and for the American presidency. **B**
- 11. HEARTBREAK IS THE NATIONAL ANTHEM, by Rob Sheffield. (Dey Street.) A Rolling Stone journalist looks at the life and music of the pop icon Taylor Swift.
- 12. SAVE AMERICA, by Donald J. Trump. (Winning Team.) A collection of photographs and commentary from the former and future president's time in office.
- 13. THE SMALL AND THE MIGHTY, by Sharon McMahon. (Thesis.) A former high school government and law teacher profiles lesser-known Americans who made an impact. B
